<u>Speaker for MAY 15th, 2014–Bruce Gamble</u> (To Be Introduced By Dep. Cdr. Marilyn Pahr)

Many of our members will remember our May 15th speaker, author Bruce Gamble. This is the 2nd time the Round Table has had the good fortune to have this award-winning author speak to us; his last engagement was in April 2013. Bruce has written several books on World War II history specializing in highly readable narratives about World War II in the Pacific. His book titles include:

The Black Sheep: The Definitive History of Marine Fighting Squadron 214 in World War II (published in 1998); Black Sheep One: The Life of Gregory "Pappy" Boyington (published in 2000); Darkest Hour: The True Story of Lark Force at Rabaul - Australia's Worst Military Disaster of World War II (published in 2006). On May 15th he will highlight his most recent book Target:Rabaul.

Gamble was raised in Central Pennsylvania and served as a Naval Flight Officer from 1980-1988 during the closing years of the Cold War. He was deployed aboard the Aircraft Carrier Carl Vinson in the Pacific and Indian Oceans and did a tour as a instructor in Pensacola Naval Air Station, Pensacola, FL.

He was diagnosed with a malignant spinal cord tumor, and after undergoing radical surgery, retired in 1989. He began volunteering at the National Museum of Naval Aviation and was soon asked to work part-time for them. He spent several years as a staff historian at the Museum, interviewing several notable aviators and writing articles for *Foundation* Magazine. In 1998 made the leap-of-faith to become a freelance writer, publishing his first book that year.

Bruce has a total of six (6) titles now in print and has gained national recognition as one of the most respected authors on the war in the Pacific. He now does a significant amount of public speaking, is a featured historian in documentaries produced by The History Channel, Fox News Channel, PBS and the Pritzker Military Library. He won two literary awards in 2010, is a member of the Authors Guild, holds Life Memberships in the Naval Aviation Museum Foundation and Paralyzed Veterans of America. He has been Cancer-free for 20 years and lives near Panama City, FL.

<u>Review Of APRIL 17th, 2014 Speaker-Sy Goodman</u> (Introduced by Dep. Cdr. Marilyn Pahr)

Professor Sy Goodman, a Professor of International Affairs and Computing at The Sam Nun School and The College of Computing at Georgia Tech did a outstanding job as our April 17th speaker. Sy's focus was on the technological aspects of WW II, particularly Radar (Radio Detection and Ranging.)

very rapid and extensive technological innovation and one in which the victors (principally the U.S. and Britain) ended up with a technological arsenal that was greater then the arsenal they had when the war started and that the other WW II combatants (principally Germany, Japan and Russia) also benefited during and after the war from these technological innovations.

One of the main innovations was Radar. Early versions of radar like RDF (Range Detection and Finding) helped the Royal Air Force defend against attacks during the *Battle of Britain* (1940). In the Pacific, Admirals Nimitz, Spruance and Fletcher would use the early-warning benefit of radar to be victorious in the *Battle of Midway* (1942) and one form of radar, weather radar, became so important that General Eisenhower depended on it to delay and then launch the D-Day landings on June 6th, 1944 in France.

The British led the way in many aspects of developing Radar and introduced the American Scientists to the *Cavity Magnetron*, a device which enabled Radar devices to be miniaturized to the extent they could be installed on airplanes and ships, thus being the game-changer which enabled the Allies to continue to make improvements to the technology. President Roosevelt sanctioned MIT, who initiated their Radlab (Radar Lab), and other Government Agencies, private academic institutions and corporations to forge ahead in research and development of Radar technology.

Sy illuminated for the Round Table the many extraordinary electronic devices and systems that were developed in a very short time starting in the 1930's, then continued after the development of the *Cavity Magnetron*. Professor Goodman made it clear that many of today's systems are still using basic techniques developed before and during WW II and the high-technologies developed as a result then ultimately led to today's TV broadcasting, satellite- communications and cell phones.

Thank you Professor Sy Goodman for your enlightening presentation, for your devotion to teaching, research, and preserving history, and for a job well done.
